PRESIDENT'S REPORT



“ On behalf of the General Committee, it is my privilege to present to you the Singapore Cricket Club's Annual Report and Financial Statements for the year ending 31 December 2021. ”

2021 was overall a busier year for the Club. COVID-19-related safe management measures (SMMs) being less intense than in 2020, the SCC had a longer run with lesser disruptions to provide its facilities and create activities for the Members.

I am thankful to the General Committee (GC), the Subcommittees, Management and Staff for their hard work and perseverance in the face of all the challenges thrown our way throughout the year. I am also grateful to the Sections Convenors and their committees for their efforts in curating many interesting alternative formats of their games to keep their Section Members engaged in their chosen sport/activity.

With the continued increase in the number of family members, the Member Engagement Subcommittee continued to expand its range of activities to engage the wider Membership. In addition to the popular nature trail walks and city-cycle rides, we saw the addition of the Book Club, Chess and Mahjong and all have had an enthusiastic take-up rate.

As part of our community outreach programs, our Members served at the Willing Hearts Soup Kitchen more than 10 times during the year; we worked to clear our waterways with a Beach Clean-Up and Kayak Clean-Up; we supported a Lions Club initiative to collect used clothes for distribution in third world countries - the response was overwhelming and required three truck trips to transport the items.



The above activities and programmes have been well-attended by Members and it has been great seeing Members extending their network of friends and building a larger and more active club community.

After five years of protracted discussions with the Urban Redevelopment Authority (URA), the SCC finally completed the development of the Sports Shed and the Bin Centre. The Shed houses the Club's field maintenance equipment and such sport accessories necessary for the preparation of the playing fields for the different sports. Aesthetically and practically, it is a vast improvement and does greater justice to the SCC as a premier Sports Club in the Civic District.

Members will also have noticed the greater efficiency of the air-conditioning systems with our new chillers which were installed in the later part of the year.

Even with capital expenditures slightly in excess of \$1.0 million, we were able to generate a positive cash flow and increase our total cash and near cash resources by \$1.41 million to \$28.45 million.

Revenues from F&B, Sports & Recreation as well as Membership transfers and conversion fees all increased over the previous year – let us hope these are symptomatic of the gradual economic recovery we are starting to enjoy as we seek to return to pre-COVID-19 activities.

At the time of writing, the government has confirmed that a new contract has been signed which will see the Formula 1 Singapore Grand Prix in Singapore till 2028. The F1 event at the Club has always been very well organised and patronised and we look forward to the buzz it will once again generate.

We also spent some time during our term evaluating the Club's main operating controls and procedures. An outsourced independent internal audit company reviewed the Club's internal controls of its operations. The Management team, under the guidance of the Finance Subcommittee (FSC) and GC, will be working on the recommended improvements.

With the rapid digitalization now transforming the whole business eco-system, the FSC initiated an in-depth IT Security Review in May/June 2021 to assess the Club's overall IT infrastructure and related security setup.

Following up on the findings, the FSC, with the full support of the GC, has drawn up an IT Roadmap for progressive Priority actions towards a systematic and targeted approach to improve and further streamline the current IT infrastructure for 2022 and beyond.

The SCC has been granted an In-Principal Approval for the renewal of the lease for the Club building and Padang field for a further 30 years which Members overwhelmingly voted in favour for at the Special General Meeting (SGM) on 30 October 2020. There being a high level of assurance that Members will support the lease extension, the Club could start to focus on whether we should seek to upgrade and enhance our current facilities to better meet Members' aspirations for the next 30 years.

The GC, through its Planning Study Subcommittee, has commissioned a review of a possible underground development and also to review the setting up of permanent roofing over the Stumps and Gilmour terraces and the Courtyard. Our consultants have begun to engage with the relevant government authorities in this regard. Any such approved design would naturally have to complement the aesthetics and the conservation status of the SCC Clubhouse.

Alongside the above, it may be an opportune time for the Club to review the possibility of an off-site facility to increase the range of offerings to its Members.

Our Sports Academies for Cricket, Rugby, Football and Tennis were able to continue coaching SCC kids, albeit within ever-evolving SMMs. At its peak last year, the SCC Junior Cricket Program had an enrolment of 295 children and the program facilitated the signing up of 15 new JSMs and five Ordinary Transferable Members to the Club.

The Rugby Academy is now one of the largest in Singapore with almost 600 children and youth. It is administered and coached by SCC Members with a clear pathway set in place for the academy youngsters to grow into and join the Club and the Rugby Section.

Meanwhile the Football Academy continues to grow and evolve with 80 children, and innovates with special programs, such as its June Summer Camp with guest VIP coaches. The latter initiative provided an opportunity to interact with and learn from our Singapore Football Legends and was inspiring to the academy children.



In August 2021, we launched our Hockey Section's first academy – The Hockey SCChool – and it has quickly grown to now coach close to 30 children. The academy is run in-house with the Section's head coach leading it while aided by Section players and parent volunteers.

This year, there are plans to launch a Squash Academy too, and we hope to have a positive update about it soon.

Thanks to the diligent efforts of the Sports Department, SCC was approved by the Ministry of Trade and Industry (MTI)/Sport Singapore for a special pilot scheme for team sports resumption under Vaccination-Differentiated SMMs (VDS) + Test Protocol at the start of 2022; SCC is one of the very few private clubs permitted into this scheme.

This is great news for the Club's team sports Sections which can now play in larger groups under strictly controlled and supervised conditions, and we believe this is a positive sign for the full resumption of team sports and, hopefully, the return of Club tournaments in coming months.

In November, we launched a Club Survey with question segments covering every aspect of our Club life – including sports, events and activities, F&B, facilities and other services. A total of 661 Members took the survey and the feedback received has been invaluable. The Club Management is currently evaluating the comprehensive results, following which we plan to work on new initiatives and strategies for future development.

After serving our Club for the past four years, our Club's General Manager Mr. Sean Boyle informed the GC that he would not be requesting an extension of his current contract and that he intends to retire and return to the United Kingdom. On behalf of the GC, we thank Mr. Boyle for his dedication and service and wish him all the best in this next chapter in his life.

At the time of writing, we are searching for a candidate who understands our Club's rich heritage, our needs, and has the capabilities to lead the Club Management positively into the future. We will keep Members informed of developments.

2022 looks to be a brighter year in spite of the emergence of the Omicron variant in the first quarter. Vaccination rates in Singapore are at more than 90%; more travel routes look to reopen; the Formula 1 Singapore Grand Prix is set to race in end-September.

This 2022 also marks the 170th year since the Club was established in 1852. This is a significant milestone for a heritage sports club that has been able to remain relevant in the 21st century to its multi-racial local and resident Members and the wider local and regional sports communities it has become integral to. We are hopeful for the future.

I take this opportunity to thank our Members for your trust in us, and look forward to progressing together to fly the Singapore Cricket Club flag sky-high.

Citius, Altius, Fortius – Faster, Higher, Stronger

The Olympic Movement motto comes first to mind as we look at what Sports had to offer in the last year. The sporting community has been treated to both Summer and Winter Olympics, a sight we have not had since 1992.

Back home, we were less fortunate when it came to the resumption of full sports activities. The last two years have been a true rollercoaster ride with restrictions on sporting activities changing every four to six months. Kudos to the Convenors, Sections Committees and the Sports Department for adjusting and adopting to all the changes; they all worked tirelessly to make most of the situation and ensured that Sports never stopped in the Club. This was a feat most appreciated by the Members who could continue to keep physically active. At the time of writing this report, the Club is abuzz preparing for the resumption of the even bigger team sports format where full team matches can be played again.

Billiards, Bowls, Squash and Tennis were the few Sections least affected by the restriction in place and they continued to fly the SCC flag high. SCC Billiards & Snooker were runners-up in the 2021 National Snooker League - Div 4. Peter Gilchrist has joined a group of elite players to have ever achieved 147 in a single break, while playing at the Club.

SCC Bowls played host to the National Paris tournament and the home advantage paid off. It was an all-SCC finals in both the Men's and Women's Finals. The winning momentum continued a few months later when SCC also won the National Singles (21 shots) Women's title and our Club President Mr. Zoher Motiwalla won the Men's National Singles (7-7-1); he will be representing Singapore at the World Indoors Singles in Bristol in April 2022.

Squash achieved four titles in the Women's Singles of National Squash Championship, the Women's Div 3 of SG Squash Circuit and Under 15 of SG Squash Junior Circuit – 1st Leg and the Women's Singles of SG Squash Close Circuit (II). Additionally, SCC Members represented Singapore in the 20th Asian Team Championship (Aaron Liang, Jerome Aw and Chua Man Tong), the Thailand Individual Squash Championship (Aaron Liang, Jerome Aw, Kieran Tan, Vicky Lai and Ong Zhe Sim), and Czech Pro Series VI 2021 (Au Yeong Wai Yhann).

Tennis once again outdid the previous year's achievements by winning six national titles in Men's A & B and Women's A in the Interclub Singles League; Men's A and Women's A in the Interclub Doubles League, and Men's B Interclub Knockout.

My heartiest congratulations to all the winners, coaches and Members behind the success.

Sections which leagues could not restart have sought to create in-house competitions, social outings and friendly matches with other clubs. Among others, Bridge held their first overseas friendly online bridge game with the Marylebone Cricket Club; Football and Hockey Sections organised coaching, umpires and first aid courses as part of their capability development series: Sections volunteered and contributed to good charitable causes. I am proud of the Convenors and their Section Committees for exploring and organising many different activities to keep their Members active. More details about these examples are highlighted in the individual Sections' reports.

For the first time, the Inaugural SCC Olympic Virtual Run & Walk was held from 27 July to 8 August in conjunction with the Tokyo Olympics 2020 – an idea originated by the Sports Department. 98 unique participants - 21 ladies & 77 Men, of which 22 were JSMS - took part in the event. The Rugby Section scored double whammy and emerged as the champions for both Intersection categories: Longest Walk and Longest Distance. Together, the SCC Family ran/walked a total distance of 2,674.92km!



Talent scouting and the training of newcomers continued as Sections carried on welcoming new Members, providing mentorship, and discovering new pool of talents. Among them, a 10 year-old boy, Arman, was recruited from one of the SCC-SportCares Bowls clinics.

Despite the challenging period, the academies' numbers increased. The latest addition to the SCC Academy Family was The Hockey SCCchool, which was launched on 31 August.

SCC-SPORTCARE PARTNERSHIP CONTINUES IN 2021

The second run of the collaboration was successfully conducted with the organisation of four cricket clinics. After the last session, the program was temporarily suspended due to new safety restrictions.

APPRECIATION

2021 is my third consecutive year as the Games Control Board Chairman, and therefore also my last. I am truly humbled to be given the opportunity to serve the Club and to have worked with such a dedicated and talented group of fellow Members. I offer my heartfelt appreciation to the Games Control Board (GCB) Members comprising Convenors from 13 Sports Sections and my fellow GC Members Mathavan Devadas, Samuel Sharpe and Fathima Mohiethen.

I also wish to acknowledge all the Members, volunteers, Section captains, Section Committee Members and Convenors who spent endless hours organizing trainings, arranging teams, who come an hour earlier before everybody else to put goal posts in place and mark out fields with cones. My sincere appreciation for your dedication.

None of what the Club has build and achieved over the years would be possible without a strong day-to-day Sports Department. My thanks goes to the entire team (Wendy, Clara, Tory, Rashed and all the groundsmen) led by Janet. They are the backbone of the Club.

I look forward to see what future brings to Sports at SCC.

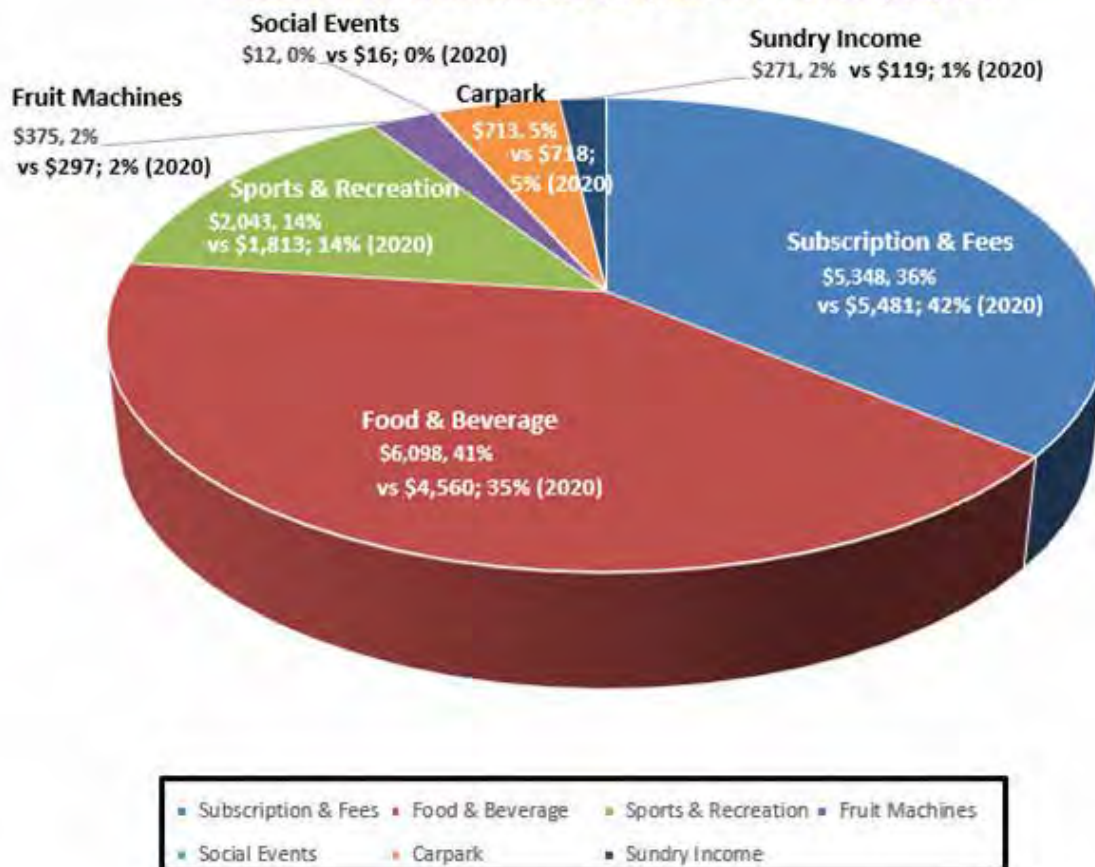

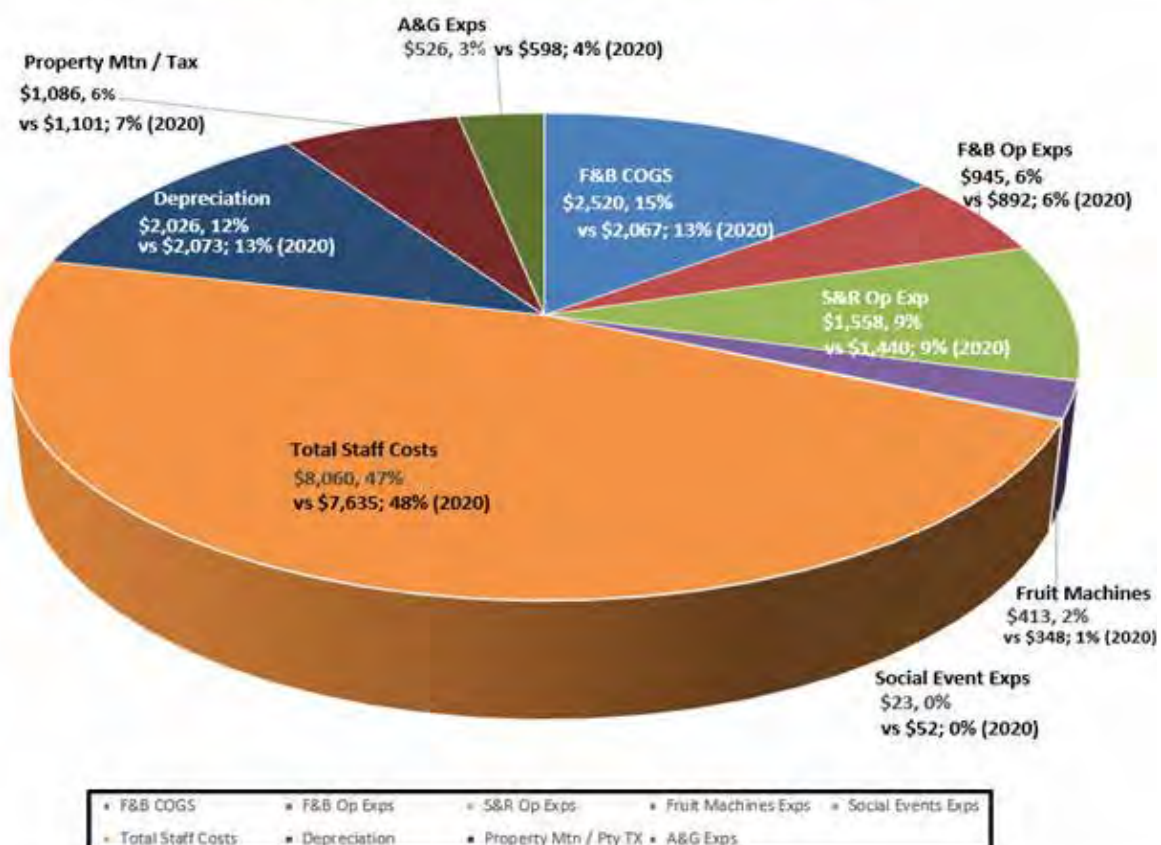

The year 2021 started off with the hope that with the COVID-19-related lessons learned in 2020 and with the early 2021 lightened restrictions on groups and related social gatherings, we could at least return to a certain level of normalcy in the new year.

The first quarter of 2021 reflected this hope. However, as reality would have it, from 16 May to 20 June the Heightened Alert (HA) Phase was announced to curb the then-rising third wave of infection and with it, a strict no dine-in safe management measure was reimposed on all F&B outlets during this period. It was also officially announced that the Formula 1 Singapore Grand Prix, earlier scheduled for the first week of October 2021 was cancelled for a successive second year.

The situation improved marginally and dine-in with restriction to two persons per group was allowed from 21 June. However, the HA Phase 2 was soon imposed with no dine-in again from 22 July to 9 August to further control another wave of high infection. Pivoted Bar outlets the Main Lounge and Stumps were also directed to close from 16 July to 31 August as a direct result of the large KTV cluster infection.

Intermittently, during this HA Phase, dine-in with restriction to groups of five, then two again and back to five from 22 November until now were imposed to rein in the high infection situation.

Hopefully, with the now high vaccination rate of >90%, the Living with COVID-19 Phase can finally dawn upon us even as we are hopeful for the eventual re-opening of the remaining F&B outlets, namely The Deli and the Men's Bar in 2022.

With the phased reductions in the Jobs Support Scheme (JSS) grants during the year, the total JSS and related support received from the government for FY 2021 was \$509K compared to \$1.754 million in FY 2020.

Beside the negative impact on the F&B segment brought about by the HA Phase, Sports (cancellation of all four major SCC International Invitational Events and Singapore Grand Prix for a second successive year) were also badly hit.

To mitigate and balance these substantial top-line shortfalls as well as the reduced JSS support, the cost containment measures imposed earlier in FY 2020 were extended to all areas of staff and operational costs and we are glad to report that for FY 2021, we managed to contain the Operating Deficit to just \$2.298 million after Depreciation and a Net Bottom Line deficit of \$76K after membership transfer and conversion fees and tax expense.

A. OPERATING RESULTS

1. Operating Revenue

Operating Revenues of \$14.859 million were \$1.855 million or 14.3% higher than last year's \$13.004 million with encouraging recovery from F&B and Sports - two revenue centres worst hit by the pandemic disruptions in 2020 and 2021's Heightened Alert.

Subscriptions and fees accounted for 36% of the Club's 2021 overall revenues, showing a decrease of 6% points over 2020's 42% as the result of the higher contribution from F&B (41% vs LY 35%) and stable Sports (13.6% vs LY 13.9%) segments despite the prevailing HA situation.

F&B total revenue – despite the intermittent disruptions on group dine-in protocols from May to November 2021, having Men's Bar and Deli still closed to-date, as well as Banquet operations being badly affected - was \$6.098 million against \$4.560 million in 2020, a substantial recovery of \$1.538 million or 33.7%.

Sports & Recreation total revenue was \$2,043 million, which was \$230K above 2020's \$1,813 million, in part due to the National Gallery 2020 Light Up event which spread over into early 2021.

2. Operating Expenditure

Operating Expenditure was \$17.158 million, \$951k or 5.9% higher than last year's total of \$16.207 million. Major increases were from the following Cost Centres

- Cost of F&B Sales (COGS): F&B COGS were higher at 41.3% as compared with last year's 38.9%, an increase of 2.4% points due mainly to disruptions to the supply chain and logistics sector issues.
- Payroll & Related Expenses: With operations disrupted, most variable components of manpower costs such as overtime and part-time staff, recruitment for vacancies, non-essential staff benefits and welfare (e.g. Staff Annual Dinner & Dance was cancelled) remained suspended in FY 2021. A total of \$95k was saved with these initiatives. On the flip side, more was incurred for medical and hospitalisation costs and the 10% MVC for management staff for the second half of FY 2020 was discontinued in FY 2021.
- Direct Operating and Overhead Expenses: All non-essential operation contracts remained on hold or were cancelled. However, in line with the increase in overall Club activities, total expenses increased by 3.2% to \$3.55 million in 2021 over 2020.

3. Operating Deficit

The Operating Deficit of \$2.298 million was \$904k lower than last year's deficit of \$3.202 million against a backdrop of a partial recovery in revenues tempered with continued disruptions caused by the COVID-19 variants which had adverse impacts on the F&B and Sports revenue as well as a tightened labour market caused by the departure of mainly Malaysian and PRC staff resulting in an unchanged staff head count.

4. Net Surplus / (Deficit) After Income Tax

The Club suffered a small net deficit of \$76k, compared with a net surplus of \$169K for last year. This reduced deficit should be read in the light of a still very challenging living-with-COVID-19 year 2021 and with the reduced assistance of the Heightened Alert (HA) Enhanced JSS government grant of \$509k against last year's \$1.754 million.

B. HIGHLIGHTS OF THE FINANCIAL YEAR

1. Food and Beverage (F&B)

The F&B Operations incurred a deficit of \$1.696 million, a significant improvement of \$862k over the prior year's deficit of \$2.558 million.

Both revenue and cost of sales have grown, with the gross profit improving by 4.0% points partly due to the \$750k F&B Credits that were given to Members in FY 2020. Enhanced culinary promotions and other offerings especially during the HA period were the main drivers of increased takeaways and retail sales.

2. Sports & Recreation (S&R)

S&R saw an increase in revenue of \$230k, mainly due to higher Coaching and Sport Sections Income of \$237k and \$73k respectively due to the partial relaxation of team sports group size restrictions, which directly drew increased activities especially in the Cricket youth academy and Tennis coaching programmes.

The above was partially offset by a lower Sports membership income of \$103k mainly caused by lower take up of new Sports membership in FY 2021 owing to the COVID-19 restrictions.

On a departmental level, S&R bottom line performance ended with the net deficit of \$269k, lower by \$118k from the prior year, mainly driven by the higher revenue base in FY 2021.

3. Manpower Costs

The total manpower cost was \$8.060 million vs FY 2020 \$7.635 million with a year-on-year increase of 5.6%. It should also be noted that there were no 10% MVC salary deduction in FY 2021 for Management and Executive staff unlike in FY 2020 where the 10% MVC for M&E staff was applied from July to December 2020.

4. Membership Transfers

Membership Transfer Fees remained vibrant and increased further by \$240k from a ready pool of keen buyers.

Conversions to OTM also saw an increase of \$50k when compared to the previous year.

5. Capital Expenditure

Capital expenditure during 2021 totalled \$1,093K, the main items being:

6. Cash Position

The Club generated positive cash flows from operating activities of \$934K (2020 = \$2,123K) and a further \$1,652K (2020 = \$1,362K) from membership transfers and conversion fees, and had Capital Expenditure of \$1,093K (2020 = \$248K).

As at FY 31 December 2021, the Club had Total Cash and Near Cash resources of \$28.45 million versus \$27.04 million in 2020, an increase of \$1.41 million.

At the end of 2021, a total of \$18.38 million was kept in Fixed Deposits with various established banks in Singapore while another \$5.05 million was held in Current Accounts with the three local banks for daily operations and other cash flow needs. The investment in the approved UOB SGD Bond Fund was \$5.02 million.

The Sinking Fund, which was established in 2016 for the purpose of the 2026 Lease Renewal for the Club which includes the Padang field and for Capital Expenditure specifically authorized by the general body of members, now stands at \$20.44 million after further injection of \$1.65 million from Transfer and Conversion fees and \$52.5k from Fixed Deposits interest for the year.

C. OTHER KEY INITIATIVES IN FY 2021

1. Investment Subcommittee (ISC)

At the AGM in April 2021, the general membership approved the formation of the Investment Subcommittee.

The ISC key objective as set out in its Terms of Reference is to enhance investment returns whilst endeavouring to protect capital derived from the Club's cash reserves. The FSC provides oversight of the investment portfolio, monitors the risks and recommends adjustments to the investment portfolio as needed.

2. IT Security Review

Against a backdrop of an ever-evolving IT landscape and with the Club's increased exposure to and risk of cyber security and other IT related security attacks in May/June 2021, Deloitte & Touche Enterprise Risk Services was appointed to perform an in-depth IT Security Review to assess the Club's overall IT infrastructure and related security arrangement.

Following the findings and recommendations of this exercise, an IT Roadmap for Priority Actions was drawn up for a systematic and targeted approach to improve and further streamline the current IT infrastructure, which is in the process of implementation.

3. Internal Audit

During the year, an outsourced independent internal audit company carried out reviews of the internal controls operating in several of the Club's operations, arising from which the recommendations made to management for strengthening financial controls and procedures are being implemented. This is part of an ongoing internal audit programme instituted by the General Committee in which all the Club's main operating controls and procedures are reviewed and tested over a three-year period.

D. THE YEAR AHEAD AND LIVING WITH COVID-19 ENDEMIC WORLD

Despite the long shadow of the Omicron variant, it was most reassuring and welcome news that the Formula 1 Singapore Grand Prix 2022 edition will take place in October 2022 and will continue for another six years until 2028.

And now with the vaccination rate at >90% in Singapore and in most other developed countries, it is hoped that the world at large will gradually reopen and will be able to at least return to some semblance of normality during the coming year.

Throughout a still-difficult FY 2021 with its "on-off and on again" safe management measures and restrictions, the unwavering loyalty and support provided by the Members was again one feature that really stood out.

At the AGM 2021 in April, the general membership approved the formation of the Investment Subcommittee (ISC), and after going through a rigorous selection process, five Members were appointed and approved by the General Committee (GC) in July 2021, with one GC Member acting as the liaison between the Subcommittee and GC.

With their years of combined experience and expertise in the banking and investment sectors, the ISC Terms of Reference and Investment Framework were established and approved by the GC in November 2021 for placement of funds for investment in FY 2022 with the following appointed Funds Manager:

- Lion Global Investors (LGI)
- Fullerton Fund Management (FFM)

PORTFOLIO REPORT

In January 2021, before the formation of ISC, a total of \$5 million was invested in the SCC-approved UOB SGD Fund. As at 31 December 2021, the portfolio valuation was \$5,019,857 at market closing price, giving a net return of 0.40% for the year.

The ISC will continue to endeavour in its key objective of enhancing investment returns whilst protecting capital as outlined in the ISC Terms of Reference.

Investments will be made into conservative funds with bonds and short-term loans as the underlying investments. It is expected that investments will be made as existing bank deposits mature but may be deferred if there is an expectation of short-term fund price volatility.

The Establishment Subcommittee in 2021 continued to play an active part in the pursuit of the Club's mission: To be the premier sports & social club in Asia by providing excellent services & facilities to our Members.

The provision of excellent services, the focus of the Establishment Subcommittee, requires constant attention to the people who make this happen every day of the year, COVID-19 notwithstanding – which unfortunately continued to have a massive impact on our operations and indeed our daily lives.

Resilience, flexibility and the need to remain nimble in response to ever-changing rules arising from COVID-19 that govern public health – which were first evident in our people in 2020 – were reinforced in 2021, the second consecutive year of the pandemic. These qualities, along with others inherent in our culture, made significant contributions to our ability to maintain and indeed improve our service standards to meet Members' needs, not least the safety and health of all, amidst the challenging circumstances.

ATTRACTION

The continued tightening of rules governing the recruitment of foreign staff - a measure intended to promote the hiring of Singapore citizens and PRs (which we strenuously attempt to do for each recruitment) – although not without its challenges, has not thus far impacted our ability to attract the skills, experience and talent required by the Club.

Recruitment was stepped up with 61 people hired, almost double that of 2020 when hiring was frozen for three quarters due to the impact of COVID-19 on Club operations. The time taken to recruit staff however, ranged from two to four weeks essentially flat vs 2020.

RETENTION

Full year staff turnover was 17% vs 19% for 2020. Recent data suggests we did appreciably better than some other social clubs.

Consistent with the previous year, one month's Annual Wage Supplement (AWS) was paid to all eligible staff in December 2021 and one month's Annual Variable Compensation (AVC) was accrued in our financial books for payment in April 2022. Appropriate base pay adjustments were also made in mid-year.

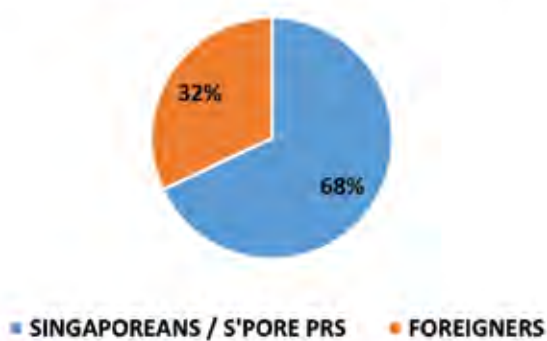

DEVELOPMENT

Staff training, which unfortunately had to take a backseat in the previous year, was somewhat resumed in 2021 as permitted by COVID-19 rules and the pivot to online training where it was possible - focused training of staff in first-aid, workplace safety, food safety and hygiene were conducted; three staff were trained in leadership skills, others in software and marketing skills.

In keeping with our preference to reward and recognise in-house talent based on proven performance and potential, 13 staff were promoted. This represents 7% of total staff and compares with the five promotions in 2020.

MOTIVATION

Many compliments for staff continued to be received from Members.

A total of 36 staff received quarterly recognition awards based on inputs from Members and supervisors.

Three staff received a total of one gold and two silver SHATEC awards:

For the second straight year, the virulent situation in Singapore impacted many factions of the Club. Specifically, SCC's Food and Beverage (F&B) operations were not spared the many necessary changes that had to be implemented swiftly for the health and safety of Members. Group sizes kept varying between eight, two and five, outlets ceased operations due to the heightened alerts, and two outlets had to be refitted in order to pivot from their bar licenses to snack counter licenses. Many revenue-generating events, such as the F1 Night Race and celebratory private events, were cancelled.

As the saying goes, when life throws you lemons.....

Make Margaritas and create mouth-watering and irresistible selections of food and drink.

That was just what the F&B Department did, coming up with reinventions and new strategies to cap a positive year across F&B outlets despite the challenges faced with the COVID-19 pandemic. Together with the F&B Subcommittee, the team focused on new initiatives to appeal to Members. We have seen very encouraging results in F&B for the year 2021.

NEW FOOD & BEVERAGE INITIATIVES

A gamut of F&B promotions were introduced during the year in review, resulting in encouraging response from our Members and their guests.

During the Heightened Alert periods (limits of two persons to dine-in), the team quickly ramped up the GO-GO SCC Takeaway & Delivery service together with the GO-GO SCC Takeaway Online Portal service so that Members could continue to enjoy SCC favourites in the comfort of their homes. There were hearty and healthy selections for home-hosting and family dinners as well as takeaway wine and spirits bundles.

The F&B team improved the range and presentation of the Carvery Lunch at the Main Lounge, revamped the Afternoon Tea offerings and introduced the Happy Hour Snacks menu. The Oval & Verandah, Padang Restaurant and Bar Ala Carte menus introduced more vegetarian and healthier choices, all attractively priced.

As part of the Club's efforts to go green, biodigesters in the The Oval & Verandah and Padang Restaurant kitchens were installed and since then have reduced on-site food waste while saving on haulage costs.

BARS

The safe management measures (SMMs) required that four of our outlets which carried Bar licences had to be closed as required by the government as they came under the broader Nightlife and Entertainment category. We closed and quickly reconfigured parts of the Main Lounge and STUMPS which were affected by the restrictions so that we could pivot to a snack counter license and restart operations as quickly as possible. We were not able to pivot the Men's Bar & Deli but remain hopeful that the buzz will return to these popular meeting places when COVID-19 restrictions are eventually lifted.

During the year in review, Members would have noticed better glassware for whiskies and wines which the Club invested in. We also introduced a wider selection of fine wines from all over the world, and at different price points to give Members more options.

RESTAURANTS

The Padang Restaurant and Padang Landing were converted to a full-day restaurant with afternoon service during the closure of the Bars, and their décor enhanced with fresh flowers and new glassware. At the Oval Restaurant new table lamps were added to uplift the dinner experience. The Courtyard provided additional dining space for Members.

The Oval & Verandah continue to offer a full range of SCC signature dishes as well as a wide variety of local and Western specials. Popular monthly specials were introduced to our menu and we are pleased to say that these were well-received. Our weekly Friday Indian Specials and Singapore Hawker Delights Nights have continued to be a hit with Members.

The Oval & Verandah kitchen's revamped washing area has improved its efficiency as well as hygiene to create a healthy working environment for our culinary team.

TRAINING

Upskilling remains core to our training programme, including staff training focused on improving service standards and product knowledge. We also included a module to improve our staff's knowledge of the new wines we introduced.

Since the point-of-sales system, Northstar, came on board in December 2017, the Club introduced an iPad ordering system in March 2018. This has boosted efficiency while offering Members a seamless service.

EVENTS

The SCC Wine and Gourmet Series at The Padang Restaurant was reintroduced on a monthly basis when pandemic restrictions were eased. It has proved to be a huge success; wine dinners are now operating two nights per month at full house. Wine dinners will continue in the year ahead, allowing Members to discover and learn about the charms of many exquisite wines from various wine-producing regions and how to best pair labels with their meals when they dine at the Club.

BANQUET

During 2021, Banquet continued to be adversely affected. Nonetheless, the Club made up for this setback and reinvented the Gilmour Room & Victoria Room into dining areas. The team introduced attractive wedding & seminar packages that complied with SMMs. Those who held their special small-scale approved events here were awed by our wonderful menu selections and stunning views of the skyline from The Padang Restaurant, Gilmour Room & Terrace, and our banquet services received excellent feedback from happy Members and guests.

WINE CIRCLE

The Wine Circle has to date over 225 Members. The Section has been extremely active with a slew of initiatives that include wine classes and onsite and virtual events, such as Old World vs New World Wines Masterclass, Italian Discovery Workshop, Wine Tasting with Petersons Wines, Hidden Gems – Challenging the Classics, Introduction to Chinese Wines, and Fonterra Cheese and Wine Pairing Experience.

GOOD HYGIENE PRACTICES

The F&B Department made no compromise in striving for the highest standard of food hygiene. Regular sanitation of our kitchens and all our F&B outlets earned us an 'A' Grade awarded by the Singapore Food Agency (SFA). Commitment to this area will continue to be the F&B team's utmost priority.

CONCLUSION

As we move forward, the focus will be on improving food quality and consistency, and providing a pleasing experience for Members and their guests when dining and socialising at the Club.

I would like to give a shout out to our frontliners - the service staff at our F&B outlets who faced many challenges brought on by the pandemic situation, such as having to take regular ART tests and doubling up on work when their colleagues were on medical leave. Their 'can do' attitude, friendly demeanour and service excellence continue to be legendary.

Behind the scenes, kudos also goes to the F&B Administrative and Operations team, including our kitchen staff, who have worked tirelessly in a very tough year while having to adapt to fast changing conditions. They are driven to go beyond expectations to give Members the best F&B experience while achieving healthy results for the Club.

A big 'Thank You' to Members of the F&B Subcommittee for their time and significant contribution to the success of 2021. Subcommittee Members are a conduit between Members and Management and have an important part in ensuring continuous improvements in our F&B offerings.

Members, thank you for your support and kind words to our F&B team, your invaluable comments – the good, the bad and the ugly. We are guided by your feedback in striving to offer the best food, the best beverages and the best service quality possible for memorable experiences for you, your families and your guests.

The Marketing and Communications Subcommittee oversees all matters relating to Club corporate brand governance, media and public relations, internal and external communications policies, and the Club's communications and promotional collaterals and publications, including but not limited to:

- The Club's bi-monthly publication – The Padang Magazine
- Annual Reports
- SCC Website
- Social Media platforms – FaceBook, Instagram, Twitter, LinkedIn, Telegram.
- Electronic mailers i.e. eBlasts
- Club Events' collaterals
- Food & Beverage collaterals
- Sports Department's & Sections' collaterals

Additionally, it also advises on the management of the Souvenir Shop.

The year 2021 was a more hopeful one after the previous term was largely handicapped by the emergence of COVID-19 and fears of the unknown virus. Yet it also had its own challenges. We had to work to disseminate news and information quickly and accurately about the constantly changing safe management measures and the resultant changes in F&B and Sports facilities operations at the Club. With competition from outside F&B growing stiffer, we had to entice Members to continue patronising the Club and spend more with the Club beyond their minimum spend. We also had to encourage participation in Club events and activities at a time when many were cautious about going out. Most importantly, we needed to utilise our communication channels to keep Members feeling connected and think of the Club as a community and lifestyle instead of just a building with facilities, dining options and some activities.

SOCIAL MEDIA PRESENCE

At the time of writing, with no ad spend, the Club's social media platforms now boasts the following numbers against the Club's active membership of 3,875:

- 1,928 Facebook Page followers; average monthly page reach of 5,173
- 1,134 Instagram followers
- 734 LinkedIn followers
- 160 Telegram subscribers
- 42 Twitter followers

The social media platforms have been a good way for the Club to keep connected in particular with Members in the 25 – 44 years age range, as well as with Members who may have had to be overseas for an extended period of time; while the majority of the audiences are from Singapore, countries such as Australia, the United Kingdom and Hong Kong have popped up in our audience analysis.

We set up our new channels in Twitter and Telegram in February and August respectively to ensure the Club has a presence in most social media platforms and more touchpoints with the Membership and potential members, even if they are not widely used by all Members.

One lesson learnt from 2020-2021 was the importance of having communication channels that could enable us to disseminate news and information very quickly. While eBlasts were effective, we realised that not everybody sets email notifications on their mobile phones and/or checks their emails regularly. Hence there were instances when the Club needed to implement changes in operations within 24-48 hours, yet there were Members who were unaware of the news because they have not checked their email inbox. This was the main reason why we decided to set up our Telegram channel which functions almost like WhatsApp but with greater privacy protections in place for our Members. If you have not joined us on Telegram, we strongly encourage you to do so via this invite link: t.me/SGCricketClub.

CONTINUED EFFECTIVENESS OF WEEKLY EBLASTS

The Club's twice-weekly eBlasts have remained the main communication and publicity driver of all Club promotions and events, and is our most effective channel. With this in view, time was spent making changes and fine-tuning our eBlasts' structural layout as well as the graphic design to accommodate the large volume of information that needs to be presented in a clean, easy-to-understand and, at the same time, aesthetically pleasing manner.



Current average open rates are at 41.8% for the approximately 5,100 email addresses to whom the eBlasts are sent to – both members and spouses who opt to receive them. This means that an average of 2,125 people open each eBlast sent to them, read about Club's promotions and events, and respond to the call to purchase/ participate in them; the F&B Department regularly reports on surges in reservations and orders whenever an eBlast is sent out.



DIRECT REVENUE GENERATION

An indication of the recognition of the effectiveness of our communication channels, we saw an increase in responses to our Media Kit publicity and general advertising enquires during the year.

In 2021, we earned \$40,900 in advertising, a 124% increase in revenue over the \$18,200 earned the previous year. The ad bookings were mainly for print advertisements in The Padang magazine, eBanners in our eBlasts, and out-of-house (OOH) advertising at SCC Dempsey.

We gave the SCC Souvenir Shop a facelift in the first quarter of 2021. Over the year, \$27,520 in gross sales were earned. Since the pandemic started, the reduced footfall in the Clubhouse due to safe management measures and the absence of overseas team tours visiting the Club have meant that sales have been restricted. This has left us with a conundrum where we recognise the necessity of introducing new interesting items to entice spending, but we also have quite a lot of existing stock in our store that need to be cleared before we order new products.

We launched a series of sales towards the end of the year to capture festive spending and help clear as much stock as we can; this has been fairly successful. In addition, we were able to source two new products with a low minimum order quantity (MOQ) for Christmas and they have been well-received. We will continue this strategy and aim to consistently refresh our product offerings to serve Members and their guests better.

Meanwhile our focused efforts in marketing F&B promotions paid off with increased patronage and revenue for the Club.

SCC CLUB SURVEY

In November 2021, the Marketing & Communications Subcommittee launched a Clubwide survey with question segments covering every aspect of Club life – including sports, events and activities, F&B, facilities and other services. A club survey of such magnitude had not been done in many years now and the General Committee and Management hope the feedback collected from the survey would help us address areas of Member concerns and provide guidance for us to develop middle- to long-term strategies for the Club.

A total of 661 Members participated in this Club Survey; we have organised and analysed the results of the survey data and disseminated the feedback to the relevant Departments and Subcommittees for evaluation. With this data, we hope the Management and Subcommittees will be able to roll out new initiatives and make plans for longer-term developments that are better aligned with the needs of our Members.

To conclude, I would like to thank the Marketing & Communications Subcommittee Members for volunteering their time to serve this term and provide guidance to the department staff. I would also like to thank the Membership for its support and feedback about our work. We will continue to strive to strategise and create beautiful yet also functional design artwork for our marketing and publicity, increase the effectiveness of our communication channels, and weave thoughtful stories that strengthen the connection between our strong SCC brand with internal and external audiences.

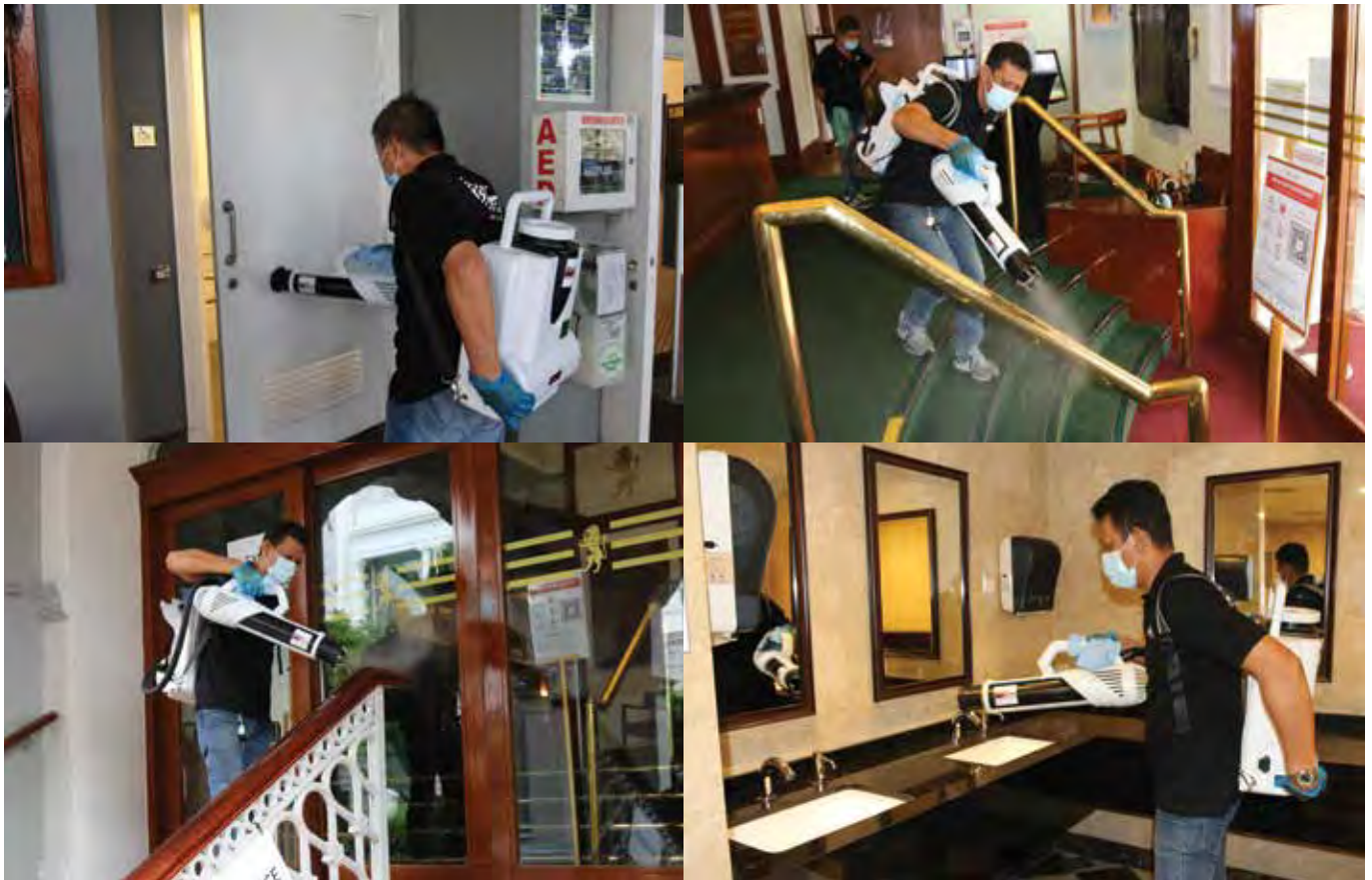

It has been two years since the COVID-19 pandemic scourge hit us and we are still in the midst of a pandemic, abiding by health protocols such as mask-wearing, frequent hand washing and limiting capacity to reduce risk of transmission. We must keep to the safety measures to mitigate risks of exposure. To provide protection to our Members, all high-contact areas in the Clubhouse were treated with a self-disinfecting anti-microbial coating – including doors and railings, the Gymnasium, Ladies' and Men's Changing Room and Staff restrooms. As we navigate the COVID-19 pandemic, our Housekeeping Team has the arduous task of maintaining high standards of hygiene and cleanliness by increasing the frequency of cleaning and sanitizing routines, as well as the disinfection of the facilities.

In view of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Property Subcommittee commissioned an Indoor Air Quality audit to measure the air quality in the Clubhouse and all parameters are within guideline stipulated in SS554 : 2016 (Code of practice for indoor air quality for air-conditioned buildings).

We continue to explore more green efforts and the Club Management has established a “Sustainability Working Group” to create sustainability awareness within the Club as well as generate ideas for effective sustainable efforts. We also installed bio-digestors in both kitchens, which have enabled us to reduce food waste and achieve a reduction in waste disposal costs.

The lighting at the Tennis Court was replaced with energy-efficient LED light fittings. The high wattage conventional lighting at the car parks was also replaced with LED light fittings, in line with Management’s “Green” initiatives.

I would encourage both Members and staff to be more conscious about energy and water conservation and hope Members will continue to support us in our green efforts as this will make the Club more sustainable.

The old air-conditioning chillers were more than 17 years old and had past the normal effective life span for such equipment. As such, we successfully completed the installation of three new air-conditioning chillers during the year and enjoyed benefits in savings for utilities and maintenance costs.

Another major project that was completed was the construction of a permanent structure for the storage of sports equipment, which we named The Shed. In 2016, the URA had informed the SCC that the canvas structures at the Padang were not authorized and not in keeping with the enhancement works carried out for the Civic District area. Despite several appeals and numerous meetings, the URA mandated the Club to construct a permanent structure.

In addition, the Club received notice from the URA to rectify the Bin Centre which encroached into government land. I am happy to report that, finally, construction works were completed before the end of December 2021 and the official opening ceremony for The Shed and Bin Centre was held on 15 January 2022 to inaugurate completion of The Shed.

Some of the improvement works that were implemented during the year included:

- Installation of grab bars in the Oval Ladies’ toilet
- Installation of two higher capacity exhaust fans and acquisition of a new air purifier for the Gymnasium to improve ventilation.
- Renovation of the handicap toilet.
- Remedial works to resolve water seepage at the Oval Men’s Toilet
- Repaired spalling concrete in the ceiling at the ex-Jackpot Room
- Replacement of Fan Coil units at the Committee Room and Oval Restaurant.
- Installation of plants at the car park, Bin Centre and The Shed for enhancement.
- Replacement of red carpet at the Main Entrance.
- Polyurethane grouting injection works were carried out at the area outside the Victoria Terrace to address issues of water leakage.

Monthly general pest control treatment for the Clubhouse and night fumigation for both kitchens were carried out to ensure the Club is free from pests. Inspections of the external perimeters of the Clubhouse were conducted regularly with the pest control vendor to ensure the Clubhouse's surroundings are clean and free from mosquito breeding.

Fire Safety is of paramount importance and a fire safety inspection of the Club's premises is conducted monthly to ensure fire safety is maintained and in compliance with fire safety regulations. The Club did not conduct a physical fire drill due to safe management measures. Instead, an in-person training to prepare and equip staff with the knowledge and tools for fire prevention and emergency preparedness was conducted. Our fire protection system is tested and inspected on a monthly basis and defects are immediately rectified while the exhaust system and ducting in both kitchens are serviced, cleaned of grease build-up and maintained regularly to minimize the fire hazard.

At the time of writing, I am happy to report that the Property Subcommittee is looking into some major upgrading works as follows:

- Replacement of external timber windows and doors
- Repainting of the Clubhouse to its original colour scheme of cream and turf green
- Infra-red thermal scanning of the Clubhouse to resolve water seepage issue

In conclusion, I would like to thank Members of the Property Subcommittee for their continuous support, invaluable contributions and dedication during the year. My appreciation also goes to Members for their kind understanding and patience when the facilities are under maintenance or being upgraded.

I would also like to extend my appreciation to the Maintenance & Housekeeping Team for their tireless efforts in maintaining the Club to the highest possible standards.

Sports memberships for some Sports Sections have been a bit more of a struggle, particularly for the sports impacted by the COVID-19 restrictions. We are confident that, as things hopefully open up a little, we will see a healthy growth in new sportsmen and women joining the Club.

CLUB MEMBERSHIP

2021 saw 280 new Members to the Club. The current active Membership stands at 3,875 as of 31 December 2021. Of the new Members, 2 were Corporate Members; 122 were Ordinary Transferable Members; 56 Term Members; 19 Sports Members; and 81 Junior Sports Members.

Despite the challenges in 2021, the Membership Department successfully recruited 122 new Ordinary Memberships - the highest record in the last five years - and we want to thank Members who participated in the member referral programmes that helped to promote the Membership of the Club. I would also like to commend the excellent work of the Membership Department in bringing on these new Members.

RECIPROCAL AGREEMENTS

The Rules & Membership Subcommittee reviews the list of existing Reciprocal Agreements with other Clubs and Associations around the world. There was a new reciprocal relationship established in 2021 with Wiener Rennverein in Austria with the General Committee's approval; at the time of writing, we are currently finalizing the agreement. Currently we have 115 Reciprocal Agreements in place and will be adding on Wiener Rennverein in 2022.

CHANGES TO CLUB RULES

In 2021 we had two general meetings of Members which resulted in a number of amendments to the Club's Rules that are currently in force. I summarise the most pertinent changes below.

At the Club's Annual General Meeting held on 27 April 2021 ("AGM"), a resolution was passed that provided that the current Rule 37 be amended to allow the Club to sensibly invest a limited amount of Club funds to ensure that the Club's investments are properly diversified. The resolution also established an investment committee which draws on the experience of a number of Club Members and ensures that the Club is sensibly advised on its investments.

The Club Rules were amended pursuant to the passing of the resolutions and the amendments were approved by the Registrar of Societies on 15 September 2021.

At the Special General Meeting held on 30 August 2021 ("SGM"), there were two resolutions of note. First, a resolution was passed allowing for General Meetings to be held physically and/or virtually (amending Rule 3(c) and 58(d)). Second, a resolution was passed (amending Rule 57) revising the requirements for Members' resolutions to be tabled at general meetings.

The Club Rules were amended pursuant to the passing of the resolutions at the SGM and the amendments were approved by the Registrar of Societies on 2 December 2021.

DISCIPLINARY MATTERS

There were a number of disciplinary matters dealt with by the Subcommittee during the year. As Members may be aware, when a breach of the Club rules has been brought to the Subcommittee's attention, the Subcommittee will consider the breach and recommend appropriate action to the General Committee. Depending on the seriousness of the matter, the Club does its best to find an informal resolution of the complaint, particularly when Members involved help with the process. It was pleasing that a number of matters were disposed of in this manner in 2021. For those caught on the wrong side of a rule breach, an appropriate apology early on can go a long way.

In more serious cases, the Subcommittee convenes an inquiry panel to look into the matter and recommend action. We are assisted here by independent volunteers drawn from across the Club's Membership. I would like to express my sincere thanks to all Members who have given up their free time this year in these matters.

CONCLUSION

I, like all of you, hope 2022 will start to become a more straightforward year when it comes to COVID-19 restrictions.

I would like to finally conclude by again extending my and the Subcommittee's warm thanks to all Members of the Club for their support in the past year, as well as to the staff, our fantastic Membership Department and our General Manager Mr. Sean Boyle (you will be greatly missed Sean!).

I would also like to thank all my fellow Subcommittee Members for all their hard work this year. As with all Subcommittees at the Club, everyone is a volunteer and gives up their free time to make this Club the wonderful place it is. That selfless commitment is truly commendable and is greatly appreciated!

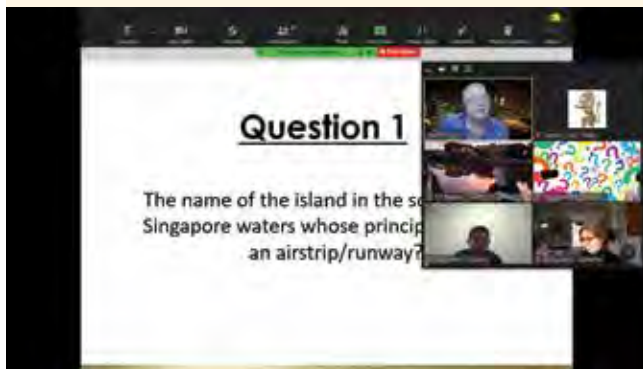

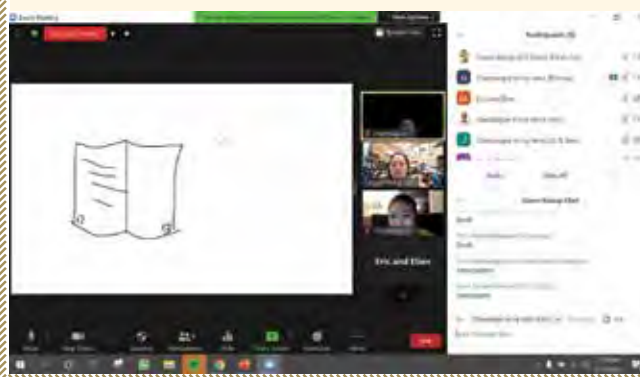

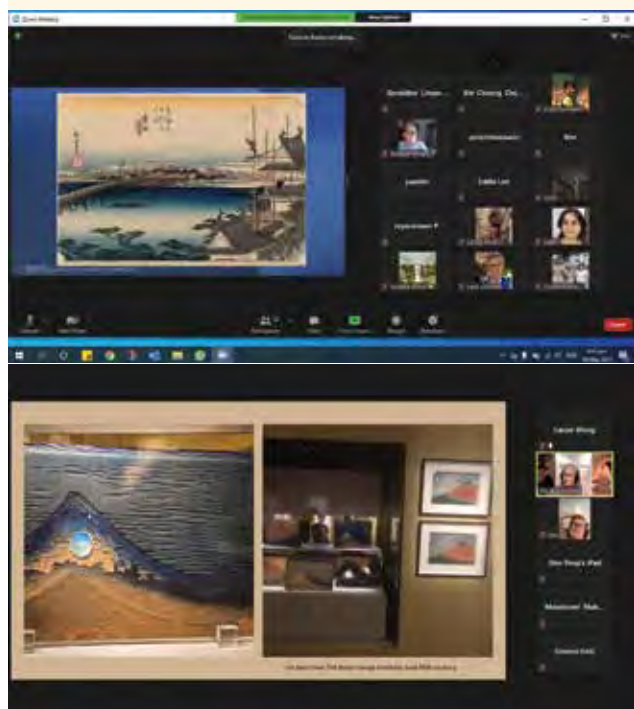

Elected 31 October 2020 - 5 February 2022

Following the suspension of games, Balut restarted with its first in-house game on 16 January 2021. As Convenor of the Balut Section, my priority is the Section Members' safety, therefore the strict requirement of wearing masks and using individual Balut cups, mats and dice were set in place. We used part of our equipment budget to purchase extra Balut cups.

We received permission to have four spaced-out tables of four persons at each table – this only allowed for 16 players at a time, therefore we held two sessions each week: one afternoon game on Saturday and one evening game on Tuesday/Thursday (depending on the availability of Gilmour Room). For the most part we could host a total of 32 players per month; there were months in between when there were no games, months were only two players a table, but Balut games carried on.

We did launch our InterSection Balut Games earlier on 10 April 2021. In the first round of games, Netball and Football participated and the overall winner was the Netball Section – their four player representatives were presented with four bottles of wine. Before we could continue with the tournament though, the pandemic situation worsened and the Balut Section Committee unanimously voted that we cancel the other games until further notice; taking into consideration the majority of the Balut Section Members are senior citizens, we also monitored the vaccination status of our members.



On Balut nights, all those playing Balut were given a \$10 F&B voucher and a bottle of water; this privilege was extended to our InterSection players as well.

Although the Section is doing well financially, we have lost over 40 Members which has in turn reduced our monthly subscription income.

Unfortunately due to COVID-19, there were no Inter-Club tournaments, nor overseas annual visits to Sabah and Sarawak. Sadly there was no POT games either. However, March 2022 will see the POT games and we look forward to that.

Due to COVID-19 and the resultant fewer games being held, the Balut Section Committee agreed to give back to Section Members who have continued paying Section subscription fees by thanking them and presenting them with \$30 F&B credits into their account. The few games that were played were subsidized. Those who played and won a game received Spot prizes in the form of vouchers. We ask for our Section Members' patience as we work on providing more subsidies.

Fortunately, we were able to have a good end to the year and hosted a sit-down Christmas lunch/dinner followed by six rounds of Balut after each meal. Door gifts, consisting of a set of Balut cup, dice and mat which we purchased from the Club, were also presented to our playing Members. By doing this, we helped to reduce Club overstock and channel income back to the Club. We also tried to contribute to Club F&B as much as the Section could afford.

At the time of writing, the Balut AGM is scheduled for 5 February 2022 - there will be a sit-down lunch, followed by the Section's annual general meeting – Convenor report, Section Treasurer report, and voting of Section Committee Members. I will be stepping down as Convenor, and take this opportunity to thank you all for your patience and understanding during my term.

TURNING THE HEADS ON BOWLS

It has been an interesting and challenging year for Bowls. Bowls in 2021 was akin to a F1 race, with many sprints, corners, pit stops and, for quite a good number of months, we were behind a safety car. Our Section Members were certainly unfazed by the disruptions and we had an almost full calendar of tournaments, missing only the international ones. The numbers in the Section have also seen a twenty percent increase, jumping from 115 in January 2021, to 142 in December. We are also the Section with the biggest age diversity, with our youngest member being only ten, and the oldest at 92!

Bowls in the international scene has undergone a radical change in the last decade. Here at SCC, we have taken various initiatives to modernise the sport and eradicate the longstanding myth that Bowls is an 'old man's game'. The Section purchased five colourful sets of Aero Bowls which have been turning heads, acquired trendsetting new Section shirts, and used technology to update live results, post fixtures and make bookings for play. With the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham just a few months away and the push by Brisbane to have the sport included in the 2032 Olympic Games, there are promises of good times ahead for the sport.



A STELLAR 2021

It is certainly not easy planning a calendar with so much uncertainty. We worked around obstacles and governmental restrictions, sometimes draconian. Notwithstanding, we organised three Section tournaments and held the National Pairs in our backyard. We also achieved record breaking entries in all the three Section tournaments held last year.

We started the year off with the Drawn Triples, which was very much welcomed after a 2020 that halted most competitive bowling and restricted those available to singles and pairs. It was heartening to see the return to some form of normalcy, albeit short-lived before the Delta variant struck, with our Members engaging in serious battle on the green for many Saturdays in February and March. Interestingly, we looked forward to every Saturday, just because we could play! The tournament was won by Christian Huang, Anwar Gaffoor and Marianne Srinivasan under the floodlights, pipping Rosemary Tessensohn, Mike Daryanani and Atiff Gill in the finals.

The SCC Singles has always been an annual tradition and we were glad that COVID-19 did not rain on our parade. However, it did take 133 days from the first till the last game played! In the McKean Cup, Christian Huang won his first-ever SCC Singles title after defeating 2021 winner Edmund Lin 21-19 in a tightly contested final. The accompanying plate event that comprised of the first-round losers was won by new Section Member, Damian McDonald. The WA Rose Bowl was won by Amira Goh, who came from a 1-10 deficit to win 21-13 against Shermeen Lim.

The year culminated with the SCC Drawn Pairs. Again, it proved to be an extremely popular event, attracting 39 bowlers. This was the first tournament where we debuted the use of technology to post fixtures, update live scores and share results. After hitting a long pause midway due to rising COVID-19 cases in Singapore, we finally concluded the pairs in early 2022. Mary Lim and Jennifer Chew proved too good for Atiff Gill and Retna Sabapathy and strolled away with a 18-8 victory.

Back in May 2021, SCC hosted the National Pairs. This was the first national tournament on our resurfaced green. We moved mountains to make it happen, and it brought much buzz to the Club, attracting even non-Section Members as spectators. We fielded eight men and three ladies teams. SCC bowlers proved we are still the best in town as we grabbed all the medal positions in the men's, while the ladies walked away with the champions and runners-up spot. The men's finals saw Christian Huang and Melvin Tan defeat Edmund Lin and Ganesh Ramanathan 21-16 after a scintillating match of precise shot-making to capture their fourth national pairs title. The ladies side saw current national squad members Shermeen Lim and Amira Goh pip Section stalwarts Rosemary Tessensohn and Mary Lim to the title.

In other national tournaments, Shermeen Lim bagged the National Singles (21 shots) title. On good years, she would have been able to represent the country at the World Champion of Champions, but the event was cancelled due to COVID-19. She also captured the inaugural Singapore Interclub Pairs League (known as the Tanglin Pairs League in previous years) with fellow SCC bowlers Chng Ming Li, Melvin Tan and Amira Goh. To find a representative at next year's



World Indoor Singles, another National Singles, played in a 7-7-1 format was organised. Ten men and four ladies represented the Club and did so well in the group stages that eight men and all ladies made the knockout stages. SCC's Zoher Motiwalla and R Srinivasan played their way into the finals that was won eventually by Zoher in a tight game. By virtue of his win, he has also won the right to represent Singapore at the World Indoor Singles in Bristol this coming April. Amira came so close to becoming his travelling partner, but narrowly lost out to May Lee of Evergreen Lawn Bowls Club in the finals.

Due to the pandemic, we were unable to receive visiting teams nor could we travel. The highly anticipated annual triangular interport and Tattersalls tournaments had to be suspended, together with our planned tours. The annual Giles Roche intersection had to be cancelled, and the POT Games postponed to early 2022.

A PROMISING 2022

We move into 2022 with great optimism that the pandemic will soon be behind us. New LED lights to be installed in the second quarter of this year paves the way for evening leagues and international events. We all miss our friendlies with visiting clubs, our tours and our 'makan' evenings and hope they return in some magnitude this coming year. Building on our solid foundation in the sport here at SCC, we hope to work closely with Bowls Singapore, the National Sporting Association for bowls, to promote and bring the sport to greater heights in our nascent nation.

Elected 5 December 2020

Another year has gone by during which the pandemic superseded everything else and has left very little to write home about. Another year when there was no competitive on-field cricket and anything in the name of 'physical activity' was limited to the use of three lanes of SCC Cricket Nets or small portions of the SCC Padang field where groups of five could train a bit.

The Section Committee however continued its untiring efforts in keeping a few things going – the Junior program, the Padang Pairs games, schools coaching, InterSection events, JSM recruitment – to name a few.

ON-FIELD CRICKET

The SCA League was cancelled for the second year running. With government restrictions in place for the greater part of the year, not more than five people could get together most of the times.

In the brief period between January – May 2021 when the restrictions were eased to accommodate groups of eight on the field, we ran our Double-Wicket competition called the 'Padang Pairs' which provided a much-needed opportunity for many to swing their arms and flex their muscles!

It was a game played by eight players divided into four pairs where one pair batted while the other three fielded and bowled. Each pair had six overs to bat and every 'Out' resulted in a penalty of five runs. Later, a seventh 'Strike' Over was introduced where the runs and penalties were doubled.

24 overs of high-voltage action had everyone craving for more. With only four fielders to chase after the ball, 24 felt like 50 when the game ended!

- A total of 136 games were played (including a few washed out) over a period of 16 weeks before the curtain was brought down due to tightening of restrictions again.
- More than 100 members – right from our 13-year-old JSMs to the most senior Sat XI players - featured across these games.
- It is worth mentioning that Members also volunteered their time to make it work by officiating.

JUNIOR CRICKET PROGRAM

Amidst an unpredictable climate in 2021, the SCC Junior Cricket Program (JCP) maintained its consistency in growing cricket in Singapore.

The program had planned for a total of four 12-week terms, which were fully subscribed, along with four multi-sports camps to be held in each quarter. Despite government restrictions, the JCP was able to complete 70 percent of academy terms and two and a half multi-sport camps.

Term One saw 283 kids enroll across the three categories – Cubs (8-12), Academy (13-16) and Girls. The Cubs and Academy saw a good surge from the previous terms with the number of Girls in the program remaining consistent at around 16.

The numbers shot up to 295 in Term Two but dipped slightly to 265 in Term Three due to restrictions in group numbers (down to four).

Nevertheless, the Junior Program at SCC continues to be extremely popular and is certainly the best-run cricket program in Southeast Asia. To lend more autonomy and improved governance, the SCC Junior cricket program will move under an independent entity called The Cricket Academy in 2022. It will continue to serve only SCC and will be simply an extension of the Cricket Section.

15 new JSMs and five new full Members joined the Club as a direct consequence of the Program initiative.

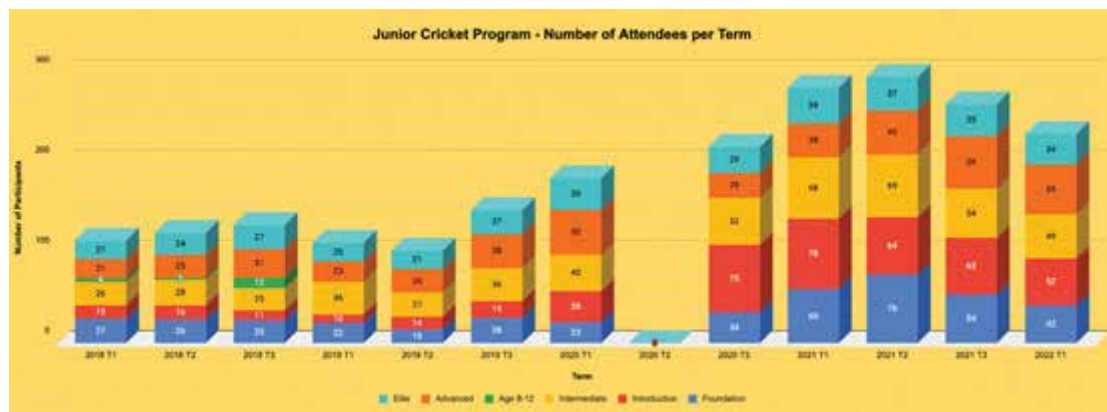

OTHER INITIATIVES (IN A SECOND COVID-19 YEAR)

The ever-continuous policy changes and restrictions did not allow the Section to run many other initiatives for its Members. A few which we were able to run, however, deserve mention:

- In March 2021, we ran a few Cricket Clinics in support of SportCares. The Club has built up a superb relationship with SportCares in recent years – an initiative by SportSG that uses Sport as the vehicle to support & better enrich lives across Singapore. This includes children from the low-income groups, 'at risk' youths, persons with disabilities and/or vulnerable seniors.

- Four Cricket themed sessions were run by our Junior and Senior coaches for youths from the Saturday Night Lights (SNL) program (District West United Juniors, Bartley Boys, Serangoon Samba and Xerox United).
- During 2021 we were fortunate enough to be able to run three Multi-sport Camps - during Easter (147 attendees), a sell-out Summer camp (265 attendees) and Christmas (26 attendees). Although the Summer Camp was halted halfway through due to a change in COVID-19 restrictions and the Christmas camp was a lot lower due to families taking advantage of the new VTLs, it still made for a great story during another pandemic-hit year.
- There wasn't much room for many social events, but Section Members participated in good number at the two 'Golf Days' that were organized at the Changi Golf Club.

IN CONCLUSION

As challenges mount, we continue to grapple with them with renewed vigour and energy. We have found new ways of dealing with the curbs and alternate ways of providing the much-needed cricketing 'fix' for our Members. A positive upward trend in the relationship between the Section and the Club Management/GC is also a cause for cheer and should help serve future committees well.

It would be remiss if I don't acknowledge the tremendous contribution of a few at the Club:

- The Section Membership foremost for their unflinching support via payment of regular subscriptions through these tough times.

- Scott McKechnie, who has since returned to the UK. As Director of Cricketing Operations over the past three years, Scott played a stellar role in bringing the CYD to its present state as well as lending a lot of professionalism to our Junior and Senior coaching. His initiatives with Singapore schools (Raffles, UWC), external sponsors, Cricket Clubs (Northants) etc have enhanced the Cricket Section's stature & reputation both within and outside the Club. His collaboration with Anish Param (Head of Pathways) and David Bennett (Head of Admin) has resulted in these two fine gentlemen being able to continue all the good work. We wish Scott the very best in his new endeavours.
- My fellow Committee Members who continue to work tirelessly despite their busy schedules and the COVID-19 challenges - Dene Border, David Bennett, Harry Taylor, Vikas Shenoy, Surya Azad, Sai Pogaru and Lee Slater. Thank you, guys for everything that you do and for being such wonderful colleagues.
- The Club Management - Sean Boyle, Janet Ng, Wendy Foo and Ng Hong Leng along with their teams, deserve our highest gratitude for their continued assistance to the Cricket Section. Also, the F&B team and Member Services Desk are always the most helpful in an hour of need.

As we step into 2022, we can only hope that things will return to normal soon. And with that hope springs renewed energy, expectancy, and anticipation. Till next time.

TEAMS:

The Netball Section is a place for all players young or the young at heart. Our youngest player is 13 and youngest-at heart player is 58. We also have a broad profile of supporting Social Members whose valued support we will always be grateful for.

The Section usually trains once a week on Wednesday evenings from 7pm - 9pm after which players gather for dinner or post training drinks to catch up on life outside of netball. Pre-pandemic, we also held regular bi-monthly themed dinner nights to which all Members of the Section would be invited to.

Pandemic drama aside, the Section usually has a packed netball-related calendar in which we host the pre-season league for 36 teams in Singapore, field four to five teams in the main National League, either host or participate in the end of year league, participate in various fun/competitive carnivals throughout the year, run a junior schools carnival to build our pipeline in November and partake in at least three tours. Somehow, we still manage to fit in our socials and participate in Club events and initiatives such as InterSections, workshops etc.

NATIONALS 2021

We managed to field three strong teams comprised entirely of our juniors for a short-lived modified Nationals season in 2021 which was prematurely cut short when restrictions changed yet again.



While the wheel was reinvented to a completely foreign format that no one had ever played before, all three teams produced some quality results in the three matches they managed to play. Considering the format and that none of the teams had ever played together before, it was a great achievement which we were unfortunately unable to finish off.

JUNIORS

With more uncertainty than the year before, we found ourselves losing many juniors due to families relocating and moving back home. However, we are confident of a new launch of the junior academy in 2022 and with sports gradually resuming, we will be able to re- develop and rebuild our pipeline of strong junior players.

PANDEMIC TRAINING

With no new leagues in sight, our focus for training had to shift too. It was the perfect timing to organize something we could have never pre-pandemic: the opportunity to organize specialized skill trainings. Not a shooter during the 'GA/GS training'? You'll still be admitted to training but on a strength-focused training then! The overall dwindling numbers and lack of leagues never once dampened our competitive spirit. Every girl for herself: a game of fastest fingers first every Monday morning when the training list gets officially released, just to make it to the 16-slot max training sessions.

With the constant change in restrictions from five pax to two pax to five pax to eight pax and back to two pax and five pax again, many in Singapore have been left wondering what 2021 had in store. We have welcomed some babies, some new Sport Members and some Juniors over the course of 2021.

JOIN US

Netball is a tough sport and most definitely not a "girls sport" as it is usually misconstrued to be. We are however, open to all levels of players from those learning to those wanting some seriously competitive games and training. A true team sport, a Netball team is truly as strong as its weakest link – building camaraderie, skills, trust among a whole host of other skills besides just the technicalities of the sport. We are looking forward to restrictions easing up and to more netball in 2022!

- In January, the men from the Rugby Section (and their better halves) appeared en masse at the SCC Beach Clean Up to help clear waste from Singapore's coastal areas along East Coast Park. By the time the shaving cream was lathered on 1 December, the boys had run over 1,500km and raised over \$12,000! A huge effort by those top lips.

KEEPING ACTIVE AND ATTEMPTING OTHER SPORTS

On the topic of long runs and dubious body hair, Club stalwart and red card magnet Rob “the Rat” Valsler anchored the Rugby Section’s domination of the inaugural SCC Olympic Virtual Run & Walk 2021. The Rat ran a mind-boggling 181.04km in one sitting to comfortably win the Men’s Longest Run. The things we do to get out of mowing the lawn! Richard Cook also took out the Masters 6km and the Section the Longest Run and Longest Walk. Fantastic work by all involved.

Other than the semi-competitive jazzercise that many Section Members endure at Section sponsor F45’s studios, games of tennis and the odd game of lawn bowls, the closest we came to competition (and rugby for that matter) was the Modified Touch Rugby we played in the middle of the year. The modifications were so that the games were COVID-19 compliant (and more complicated than a Soviet nuclear handbook).

Teams of six were randomly selected, with only four permitted to play each night. Each game had three attacking players playing against two defenders (to keep within the five pax limit), over two four-minute halves. Each team played three games a night over a 13-week competition. By the time the five pax limit was reduced back to two – causing the season to be abandoned – the leader board was anyone’s guess but credit to the coaching team and the Sports Department for allowing us to get in over 420 games in which over 3,000 tries were scored in very difficult circumstances. While Casey Mee (prematurely) declared his team the winner before kicking the only remaining ball onto the Club roof, we called it a tie between Modified Touch and the Delta Strain – though many of us were salivating about the prospect of a rematch between the blue team comprising Ben “Rocky Balboa” Radclyffe and the orange team featuring Andrew “Apollo Creed” Wheble.

SCC RUGBY ACADEMY

Despite the trying times the SCC Rugby Academy continues to grow from strength to strength. In the nine years since it was established, the Academy now has close to 600 youngsters from around 100 local and international schools, making it one of the biggest and most successful junior rugby clubs in South East Asia.

At the time of writing, the junior teams had been successfully having COVID-19 compliant run-arounds on Saturday mornings for the last several months – full credit to the kids and parents involved –

and the Colts (u17s) were imminently about to resume training. Our Under17s are an important part of the pipeline bridging the Academy and the senior men’s Section.

Led by Brendan Nolan, the Academy is an amazing compliment to the men’s Section. Not only is it our main source of younger players, it also enshrines our inclusive, fun and community-minded rugby culture. In particular, we look forward to working with the Academy to help build women’s rugby in Singapore and work towards having a women’s rugby team in our senior ranks.

SIGNING OFF

On behalf of the Rugby Section, I would like to thank the Club, its staff, the General Committee, the Games Control Board Chairman and, in particular, the Rules & Membership Subcommittee in what has been another trying year. Faced with very difficult circumstances and a rugby playing group itching to socialise and get back on the field, they have all done an incredible job in keeping the show on the road. On behalf of the Section Committee, I would also like to thank every Section Member for their patience and their contributions over the past year. #justicefortheigilmoreseven

This will also be my last Annual Report as Rugby Section Convenor, with my three-year term coming to an end. While we all would have rather spent the last year playing rugby on the Padang, touring throughout the region and beyond, holding after-match functions, and nursing sore heads and bodies on Sunday, the Pangolin’s Kiss had other ideas.

In the face of this adversity, I am extremely proud of what we have managed to achieve off the field, our contributions to the Club and broader community, and the opportunities we have taken to keep our wonderful and inclusive SCC rugby culture intact – based on unity, camaraderie and respect. I strongly believe that the Rugby Section is well placed to make the most of the post-pandemic world, whenever that emerges. With full coffers and more cabin fever than would have been felt than in the final hours of the Kursk, we look forward to a busy rugby, hosting and touring (and repeat) schedule! Watch this space...

While we saw a large gain in membership, we were saddened to see it drop by 1 in September 2021 with the passing of a much beloved Member of the Section in Bakul Parikh. He was an ever-present fixture at our Friday night socials and almost everyone that played with him will remember his infectious laugh and booming forehands. We mourn his loss and will look to hold a social tournament soon in his honour with a charity component as well.

OUR TENNIS ACHIEVEMENTS

I am happy to report that we exceeded our 2020 results in 2021 and continued our status as the eminent tennis club in Singapore based on the results from the Singapore Tennis Association (STA) national interclub tournament with a total of six titles. At the time of writing, we have an opportunity to capture a seventh with Eugene leading the Men's D team into the Doubles League semi-finals. All the best to them.

The 2021-22 year turned out to be a significant milestone in the history of the Wine Circle. Despite severe obstacles posed by COVID-19 related restrictions, the Wine Circle grew from strength to strength and delivered immense value to its Members.

MEMBERSHIP

The Membership of the Wine Circle grew by 45% i.e. from 155 members when the current Section Committee took charge, to 225 Members at the end of December 2021.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

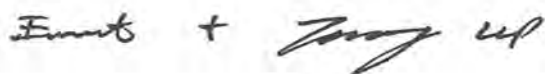

Notes to the financial statements For the financial year ended 31 December 2021

1. Corporate information

Singapore Cricket Club (the "Club"), is registered under the Societies Act with its principal place of business and registered office at Connaught Drive, Singapore 179681.

The principal activities of the Club are to promote and carry on a sports and social club for its members.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Club have been prepared in accordance with Singapore Financial Reporting Standards (FRS) and the Societies Act.

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except as disclosed in the accounting policies below.

The financial statements are presented in Singapore Dollars (SGD or \$).

2.2 Changes in accounting policies

The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year except in the current financial year, the Club has adopted all the new and revised standards which are effective for annual financial periods beginning on or after 1 January 2021. The adoption of these new/revised FRSs and INT FRSs did not have any significant effect on the financial performance or position of the Club.

The General Committee expects that the adoption of the standards and amendments above will have no material impact on the financial statements in the period of initial application.

2.4 Functional and foreign currency

(a) Functional currency

The General Committee has determined the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Club operates i.e. functional currency, to be Singapore Dollars (SGD). Sales prices and major costs of providing goods and services including major operating expenses are primarily influenced by fluctuations in SGD.

(b) Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are measured in the functional currency of the Club and are recorded on initial recognition in the functional currency at exchange rates approximating those ruling at the transaction dates. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the end of the reporting period. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are translated using the exchange rates as at the dates of the initial transactions.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items or on translating monetary items at the end of the reporting period are recognised in profit or loss.

2.5 Property, plant and equipment

All items of property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost. Subsequent to recognition, property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

When significant parts of property, plant and equipment are required to be replaced in intervals, the Club recognises such parts as individual assets with specific useful lives and depreciation, respectively. Likewise, when a major inspection is performed, its cost is recognised in the carrying amount of the property, plant and equipment as a replacement if the recognition criteria are satisfied. All other repair and maintenance costs are recognised in profit or loss as incurred.

Depreciation is recognised from the date that the property, plant and equipment are installed and are ready for use, or in respect of internally constructed assets, from the date that the asset is completed and ready for use.

No depreciation is provided on the 999-year leasehold land – office properties.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies (cont'd)

2.5 Property, plant and equipment (cont'd)

Depreciation is computed on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the assets as follows:

Leasehold land - Clubhouse	30 years
Leasehold office properties	27 to 36 years
Clubhouse	5 to 30 years
Kitchen, restaurant and bar equipment	1 to 5 years
Sports and ground equipment	5 years
Fruit machines and accessories	4 years
Office/IT equipment, furniture fixtures and fittings	3 to 6 years

The carrying values of plant and equipment are reviewed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may not be recoverable.

The residual value, useful life and depreciation method are reviewed at each financial year-end, and adjusted prospectively, if appropriate.

An item of plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on de-recognition of the asset is included in profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised.

2.6 Leases

The Club assesses at contract inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. That is, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration.

Club as a lessee

The Club applies a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases, except for short-term leases and leases of low-value assets. The Club recognises lease liabilities to make lease payments and right-of-use assets representing the right to use the underlying assets.

(a) *Rights-of-use assets*

The Club recognises right-of-use assets at the initial application date of the standard or commencement date of the lease (i.e., the date the underlying asset is available for use). Right-of-use assets are measured at cost, less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, and adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities. The cost of right-of-use assets includes the amount of lease liabilities recognised, initial direct costs incurred, and lease payments made at or before the commencement date less any lease incentives received. Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of the lease term and the estimated useful lives of the assets, as follows:

Office equipment	4.5 years
Dempsey Sports field	3 years

Club as a lessee (cont'd)

(a) Rights-of-use assets (cont'd)

If ownership of the leased asset transfers to the Club at the end of the lease term or the cost reflects the exercise of a purchase option, depreciation is calculated using the estimated useful life of the asset.

The right-of-use assets are also subject to impairment. Refer to the accounting policies in Note 2.7 Impairment of non-financial assets.

The Club's right-of-use assets are presented within property, plant and equipment (Note 4).

(b) Lease liabilities

At initial application date of the standard or commencement date of the lease, the Club recognises lease liabilities measured at the present value of lease payments to be made over the lease term. The lease payments contain fixed payments (including in-substance fixed payments) less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, and amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees. The lease payments contain penalties for terminating the lease, if the lease term reflects the Club exercising the option to terminate. Variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are recognised as expenses (unless they are incurred to produce inventories) in the period in which the event or condition that triggers the payment occurs.

In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Club uses its incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date because the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable. After the commencement date, the amount of lease liabilities is increased to reflect the accretion of interest and reduced for the lease payments made. In addition, the carrying amount of lease liabilities is remeasured if there is a modification, a change in the lease term, a change in the lease payments (e.g., changes to future payments resulting from a change in an index or rate used to determine such lease payments) or a change in the assessment of an option to purchase the underlying asset.

(c) Short-term leases and leases of low-value assets

The Club applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to its short-term leases of machinery and equipment (i.e., those leases that have a lease term of 12 months or less from the commencement date and do not contain a purchase option). It also applies the lease of low-value assets recognition exemption to leases of office equipment that are considered to be low value. Lease payments on short-term leases and leases of low-value assets are recognised as expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

(d) Rent concession

The Club has applied the amendment to FRS 116 Leases: COVID-19 Related Rent Concessions. The Club applies the practical expedient allowing it not to assess whether a rent concession related to COVID-19 is a lease modification.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies (cont'd)

2.7 Impairment of non-financial assets

The Club assesses at each reporting date whether there is an indication that an asset may be impaired. If any indication exists, or when an annual impairment testing for an asset is required, the Club makes an estimate of the asset's recoverable amount.

An asset's recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's or cash-generating unit's fair value less costs of disposal and its value in use and is determined for an individual asset, unless the asset does not generate cash inflows that are largely independent of those from other assets or group of assets. Where the carrying amount of an asset or cash-generating unit exceeds its recoverable amount, the asset is considered impaired and is written down to its recoverable amount.

Impairment losses are recognised in profit or loss.

A previously recognised impairment loss is reversed only if there has been a change in the estimates used to determine the asset's recoverable amount since the last impairment loss was recognised. If that is the case, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to its recoverable amount. That increase cannot exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation, had no impairment loss been recognised previously. Such reversal is recognised in profit or loss unless the asset is measured at revalued amount, in which case the reversal is treated as a revaluation increase.

2.8 Financial instruments

(a) Financial assets

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets are recognised when, and only when, the Club becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. The Club determines the classification of its financial assets at initial recognition.

At initial recognition, the Club measures a financial asset at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at fair value through profit or loss are expensed in profit or loss.

Receivables are measured at the amount of consideration to which the Club expects to be entitled in exchange for transferring promised goods or services to a customer, excluding amounts collected on behalf of third party, if the receivables do not contain a significant financing component at initial recognition.

Subsequent measurement – investments in debt instruments

Subsequent measurement of debt instruments depends on the Club's business model for managing the asset and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the asset.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies (cont'd)

2.8 *Financial instruments (cont'd)*

(a) *Financial assets (cont'd)*

Subsequent measurement – investments in debt instruments (cont'd)

(i) Amortised cost

Financial assets that are held for the collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest are measured at amortised cost. Financial assets are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less impairment. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the assets are de-recognised or impaired, and through amortisation process.

(ii) Fair value through profit or loss

Assets that do not meet the criteria for amortised cost or FVOCI are measured at fair value through profit or loss. A gain or loss on a debt instruments that is subsequently measured at fair value through profit or loss and is not part of a hedging relationship is recognised in profit or loss in the period in which it arises.

De-recognition

A financial asset is de-recognised where the contractual right to receive cash flows from the asset has expired. On de-recognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between the carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and any cumulative gain or loss that had been recognised in other comprehensive income is recognised in profit or loss.

(b) *Financial liabilities*

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are recognised when, and only when, the Club becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. The Club determines the classification of its financial liabilities at initial recognition.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value plus in the case of financial liabilities not at fair value through profit or loss, directly attributable transaction costs.

Subsequent measurement

After initial recognition, financial liabilities that are not carried at fair value through profit or loss are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are de-recognised, and through the amortisation process.

De-recognition

A financial liability is de-recognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. On de-recognition, the difference between the carrying amounts and the consideration paid is recognised in profit or loss.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies (cont'd)

2.9 *Impairment of financial assets*

The Club recognises an allowance for expected credit losses (ECLs) for all debt instruments not held at fair value through profit or loss and financial guarantee contracts. ECLs are based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Club expects to receive, discounted at an approximation of the original effective interest rate. The expected cash flows will include cash flows from the sale of collateral held or other credit enhancements that are integral to the contractual terms.

ECLs are recognised in two stages. For credit exposures for which there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, ECLs are provided for credit losses that result from default events that are possible within the next 12-months (a 12-month ECL). For those credit exposures for which there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, a loss allowance is recognised for credit losses expected over the remaining life of the exposure, irrespective of timing of the default (a lifetime ECL).

For receivables and contract assets, the Club applies a simplified approach in calculating ECLs. Therefore, the Club does not track changes in credit risk, but instead recognises a loss allowance based on lifetime ECLs at each reporting date. The Club has established a provision matrix that is based on its historical credit loss experience, adjusted for forward-looking factors specific to the debtors and the economic environment.

The Club considers a financial asset in default when contractual payments are 90 days past due. However, in certain cases, the Club may also consider a financial asset to be in default when internal or external information indicates that the Club is unlikely to receive the outstanding contractual amounts in full before taking into account any credit enhancements held by the Club. A financial asset is written off when there is no reasonable expectation of recovering the contractual cash flows.

2.10 *Cash and cash equivalents*

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at banks and on hand which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

2.11 *Taxes*

(a) *Current tax*

Current income tax assets and liabilities for the current and prior periods are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the taxation authorities. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted by the end of the reporting period, in the country where the Club operates and generates taxable income.

Current income taxes are recognised in profit or loss. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies (cont'd)

2.11 Taxes (cont'd)

(b) Deferred tax

Deferred tax is provided using the liability method on temporary differences at the end of the reporting period between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes.

Deferred tax liabilities are recognised for all temporary differences, except where the deferred tax liability arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences, carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses, to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry forward of unused tax credits and unused tax losses can be utilised except where the deferred tax asset relating to the deductible temporary difference arises from the initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction that is not a business combination and, at the time of the transaction, affects neither the accounting profit nor taxable profit or loss.

The carrying amount of deferred tax assets is reviewed at the end of each reporting period and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred tax assets to be utilised. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are reassessed at the end of each reporting period and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profit will allow the deferred tax assets to be recovered.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the year when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the end of each reporting period.

(c) Goods and Service Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST except:

- Where the GST incurred on a purchase of assets or services is not recoverable from the taxation authority, in which case the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense item as applicable; and
- Receivables and payables that are stated with the amount of GST included.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included as part of receivables or payables in the balance sheet.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies (cont'd)

2.12 Sinking Fund

The Club has created a sinking fund which shall only be used for the lease renewal for the Club by 2026 and for capital expenditure specifically authorised by the general body of members. All amounts received for transfer fees and conversion fees are paid to the sinking fund. The sinking fund assets are placed with fixed deposits and invested in debt securities.

2.13 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Club has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of economic resources will be required to settle the obligation and the amount of the obligation can be estimated reliably.

Provisions are reviewed at the end of the reporting period and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate. If it is no longer probable that an outflow of economic resources will be required to settle the obligation, the provision is reversed. If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects, where appropriate, the risks specific to the liability. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as a finance cost.

2.14 Employee benefits

(a) Retirement benefit costs

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans are charged as an expense as they fall due. Payments made to state-managed retirement benefit schemes, such as the Singapore Central Provident Fund, are dealt with as payments to defined contribution plans where the Club's obligations under the plans are equivalent to those arising in a defined contribution retirement benefit plan.

(b) Employee leave entitlement

Employee entitlements to annual leave are recognised when they accrue to employees. A provision is made for the estimated liability for annual leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the end of the reporting period.

2.15 Revenue

Revenue is measured based on the consideration to which the Club expects to be entitled in exchange for transferring promised goods or services to a customer, excluded amounts collected on behalf of third parties.

Revenue is recognised when the Club satisfies a performance obligation by transferring a promised good or service to the customer, which is when the customer obtains control of the good or service. A performance obligation may be satisfied at a point in time or over time. The amount of revenue recognised is the amount allocated to the satisfied performance obligation.

Revenue includes subscription fees, food and beverage revenue, sports and recreation, revenue from fruit machines and other revenue.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies (cont'd)

2.15 Revenue (cont'd)

(a) Food and beverage

Revenue from the sales of food and beverage are recognised at a point in time when goods are delivered to customers, net of discounts.

(b) Membership income

Membership income comprises of the following:

- (i) Member transfer fees are charged to a member when he/she sell his/her membership. The performance obligation is satisfied when the membership is transferred.
- (ii) Entrance fees are charged to sports and term members annually and recognised over the period of the year.

(c) Subscription fees

Subscription fees are billed monthly and recognised over the period of the month.

(d) Sports and recreation

Sports and recreation revenue is recognised over time based on the completion of services rendered.

(e) Revenue from fruit machines

Revenue from fruit machines is recognised at a point in time when the gross receipts less the relevant government taxes, payment of winnings, hopper refills and expenses is received

(f) Conversion fees income

Conversion fees income is recognised when the new membership is effective upon approval of the member by the General Committee.

(g) All other streams of income are recognised as revenue over time when the services are performed.

2.16 Interest income

Interest income from fixed deposits is recognised using the effective interest method.

2.17 Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is calculated using the first-in first-out basis. Net realisable value represents the estimated selling price less all estimated costs of completion and costs to be incurred in marketing, selling and distribution.

3. Significant accounting judgments and estimates

The preparation of the Club's financial statements requires the General Committee to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent liabilities at the end of each reporting period. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that could require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability affected in the future periods

3.1 Critical judgement made in applying the Club's accounting policies

There are no critical judgements, apart from those involving estimations (see below), that the General Committee has made in the process of applying the Club's accounting policies.

3.2 Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year is discussed below.

Allowance for impairment- receivables

Allowance for impairment is made in the financial statements based on General Committee's best estimate of the carrying amounts of receivables that are doubtful of collection after evaluation of collectability. The General Committee's judgement is required in assessing the ultimate realisation of these receivables including the current creditworthiness and the past collection history of each member. Where the expectation is different from the original estimate, such difference will impact the carrying value of the members' accounts and other receivables and impairment expense in the period in which such estimate has been changed. The carrying amounts of the members' accounts and other receivables at 31 December 2021 were \$1,891,432 and \$353,641 (2020: \$1,780,850 and \$510,958) respectively.

Based on available records, it has been ascertained that as at 31 December 2021, the cumulative surplus derived from the operation of fruit machines and other approved private lotteries is \$15.924 million (2020: \$15.962 million) before taking into account cumulative capital expenditure of \$1.615 million (2020: \$1.615 million) incurred in generating this surplus, and the allocation of the Club's general overheads.

The Singapore Government had given remission of property tax (property tax rebates) under section 6(8) of the Property Tax Act (Cap. 254) to qualifying non-residential properties in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Singapore Government had provided Small and Medium Enterprises and specified non-profit organisation rental reliefs of 2 to 4 months, covering the periods April to July 2020 and May to November 2021.

The Club is exempted from income tax in accordance with Section 11(1) of the Income Tax Act Chapter 134 as more than 50% of the Club's gross takings are from its voting members. The income tax expense in 2021 and 2020 relate to income tax payable on income received by the Club which is not related to the operating activities of the Club.

26. Discontinued operations

On 2 December 2021, the Club cancelled its private lotteries (fruit machine) permit and discontinued its fruit machine operations. The fruit machines have been written off by the Club during the year.

27. Financial risk management objectives and policies

The Club is exposed to financial risks arising from its operations and the use of financial instruments. The key financial risks include credit risk, liquidity risk and interest rate risk. The Club manages these risks as part of the general day-to-day management of its operations. It is, and has been throughout the current and previous financial year, the Club's policy that no trading in derivatives for speculative purposes shall be undertaken.

The following sections provide details regarding the Club's exposure to the above-mentioned financial risks and the objectives, policies and processes for the management of these risks.

There has been no change to the Club's exposure to these financial risks or the manner in which it manages and measures the risks.

27. Financial risk management objectives and policies (cont'd)

(a) Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of loss that may arise on outstanding financial instruments should a counterparty default on its obligations. The Club's exposure to credit risk arises primarily from members' accounts and other receivables.

The Club has adopted procedures in monitoring collections and default of payments from its debtors and members. In addition, receivable balances are monitored on an ongoing basis with the result that the Club's exposure to bad debts is not significant. Hence, the Club does not expect to incur material credit losses. Cash, fixed deposits and financial asset at fair value through profit or loss are placed with reputable and regulated financial institutions. For other financial assets, the Club minimises credit risk by dealing mainly with high credit rating counterparties.

The Club has applied the simplified approach to providing for impairment for Expected Credit Losses (ECLs) prescribed by FRS 109, which permits the use of the lifetime expected loss provision for impairment of trade receivables. To measure the ECLs, trade receivables have been grouped based on shared credit risk characteristics and the days past due. The ECLs also incorporate forward looking information.

The expected credit losses of trade receivables and contract assets for the financial years ended 31 December 2021 and 2020 are disclosed in Note 7 and Note 8.

All of the current portions of the members' accounts and other receivable balances are expected to be recovered within one year.

Exposure to credit risk

At the end of the reporting period, the Club's maximum exposure to credit risk is represented by the carrying amount of each class of financial assets recognised in the balance sheet.

(b) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Club will encounter difficulty in meeting the financial obligations due to shortage of funds. The Club's exposure to liquidity risk arises primarily from mismatches of the maturities of financial assets and liabilities.

As part of its overall liquidity management, the Club monitors and maintains a level of cash and cash equivalents deemed adequate by the General Committee to finance the Club's operations and mitigate the effects of fluctuation in cash flows.
